Pastoral Transition 101

A year ago last June, Dick Einerson started his ministry among us as our interim associate minister, working half-time. For me, it was an absolute life-saver! (I was being swallowed up as the solo pastor. The previous year, I had three weddings in the weeks surrounding Christmas: 16 services to prepare in the space of one month!) On that level alone, I am grateful for Dick's presence!

Dick also came to Plymouth with a long, outstanding career not only in parish ministry, but hospital chaplaincy. For me, as someone still relatively early in my ministry, it was a God-send to have Dick as a mentor. His wisdom frequently shone through, and I have learned much from him.

As a colleague, nobody could ask for (or imagine) more than Dick has delivered! Repeatedly, he told me, "I'm here to make your ministry flourish." That's an attitude I share with Dick and the rest of the staff, and I will share it with Sharon, too. Dick's leadership with the Calling/Caring Ministry has not only benefited those who are directly involved, it has shown us the importance of lay ministry and that we can do that well at Plymouth. When he began last year, we asked Dick to be especially attentive to what it's like to be an associate minister at Plymouth. Knowing that we have had a succession of difficult relationships and departure of associates, I wanted to see whether it was ingrained in our system, or whether it was more dependent on the personalities of clergy who had served here. No system is perfect, but Dick's analysis was that Plymouth was a great place to be an associate, that people were open and receptive to his ministry, and that I as the senior minister was collegial and supportive. I trust Dick's observations, and I am thankful to him for making them.

And I give thanks for the gift of Dick's friendship, which is something I hold dear. Saying goodbye will not be easy, but as with any transition, *it needs to be done well*. Dick has made it very clear that he will no longer be with us at Plymouth, at least for a period of time. I encourage you to find your own way of expressing your thanks to Dick for his ministry here at Plymouth,

which will end as Sharon Benton begins as our settled Associate Minister for Congregational Life & Care on November 28.

Saying hello to a new minister is far easier than saying goodbye. Both are times of celebration, but saying hello is seldom bittersweet. A clergywoman in Maine once told me, "You've never *really* been welcomed until you've been welcomed as the pastor of a church." (Given the warm reception Jean and I were given, I'd say that's true!) I know that you will also extend your love to Sharon and Jamie. What ways can you imagine to make them feel more at home? (Don't *just* think food! Got a good dentist? hair stylist? cat sitter? a favorite restaurant?) But beyond the practical parts, we will need to give Sharon our trust as our associate minister. She is a wonderfully gifted woman, and we'll need to find ways to support her personally and professionally.

Hello, goodbye, hello...That's the nature of ministerial relationships in a church. I know we'll have a good transition, as we celebrate both Dick's and Sharon's ministries with us.

Harvest Home Sunday for Larimer County Food Bank Nov. 21st

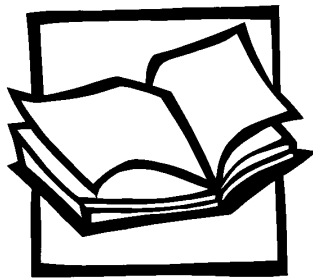

Celebration and Book Signing

On Friday, November 19 members and friends are invited to celebrate the re-

cent release of *The Prophetic Call: Celebrating Community, Earth, Justice, And Peace*, a new book edited by Plymouth member Hugh Sanborn. The gathering will be held at 7:30 PM in the Fellowship Hall. Hugh will give a reading from the book and sign copies, which will be available for purchase. Proceeds from book sales will be given to the UCM of Greater Houston.

The book is a compilation of essays from a wide range of social ethicists, activists, and theologians who probe the deepest meaning of what it means for us to take up the cross and follow the Christ today. The book promotes the perspective of prophetic Christianity and contains four sections: Community, Earth, Justice and Peace. The first two chapters in each section attempt to clarify the problematic issues and approaches to tackling them. The third chapters attempt to present a prophetic vision of worldwide community, the earth restored, worldwide justice and worldwide peace, the major visions resulting from the implications of the life and teachings of Jesus.

Rev. Hugh Sanborn, Ph.D., received his BA degree in Psychology from Muhlenberg College, BD and STM degrees from Andover Newton Theological School, and Ph.D. in Religion and Personality from the Univ. of Iowa. Hugh taught Psychology of Religion for 29 years at Rice University and served as the director of United Campus Ministry (UCM) of Greater Houston, for 22 years until his retirement in July 2002. Trained in the art of pastoral therapy, he also served several Houston churches as a pastoral therapist doing individual, marital and family therapy/counseling. From his seminary years during the civil rights movement to the present, Hugh has been involved in the peace and justice movement.

"A Force More Powerful" Film Series

On Monday, November 1 Plymouth Church continues the award-winning film series entitled "A Force More Powerful". The films use archival footage to present stories of non-violent movements around the world and are made from a documentary by the same name. Interviews with witnesses, survivors and unsung heroes who contributed to these century-changing events also are included. Each film lasts about 40 minutes and discussion will follow. The film series is designed to develop understanding of how nonviolent action can succeed in overturning dictators and securing democracy and human rights.

November 1: The story is told of the 1980 Gdansk Shipyard strike that won Poles the right to have free trade unions, launched the Solidarity movement and catapulted Lech Walesa, on a path of leadership. He eventually won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1983. The strike led to the fall of communism in **Poland** and the election of Walesa as president.

November 8: The 1983 national protest days in the copper mines of **Chile** showed that public opposition to the dictatorship of General Augusto Pinochet was possible, and signaled the start of a nonviolent democratic opposition. Brutally repressed, opposition forces persisted and eventually removed Pinochet's government in a 1988 referendum.

November 15: The story of the consumer boycott campaign against apartheid in the black townships of the Eastern Cape Province of **South Africa** in the mid 1980s is featured.

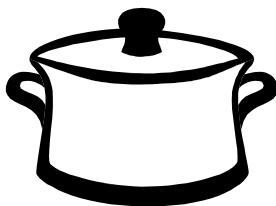
Hilltopper Luncheon

“Just Peace” Pronouncement

The Peace & Justice Ministry Team presents here, continuing from page six of the October Placard, some portions of the "Just Peace" Pronouncement and Proposal made at the Fifteenth (XV) General Synod of UCC in 1985:

The Fifteenth General Synod affirms justice as essential to a Just Peace.

1. We affirm all nations working together to insure that people everywhere will be able to meet their basic needs, including the right of every person to:
 - a. food and clean water,
 - b. adequate health care,
 - c. decent housing,
 - d. meaningful employment,
 - e. basic education,
 - f. participation in community decision-making and the political process,
 - g. freedom of worship and religious expression,
 - h. protection from torture, and
 - i. protection of rights without regard to race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, or national or social origin.

2. We affirm the establishment of a more just international order in which:

- a. trade barriers, tariffs, and debt burdens do not work against the interests of poor people, and developing nations,
- b. poor nations have a greater share in the policies and management of global economic institutions.

Lambda Community Center (LCC) is committed to creating an inclusive environment that promotes understanding, acceptance, and appreciation of GLBT issues and culture, while building equal opportunities for GLBT individuals within the North Colorado And Southern Wyoming community.

Radicalized at the age of 18 by laws that kept him from enrolling in school, a young activist Jack Mkhuzeli founded the influential Port Elizabeth Youth Congress and became a key leader of strikes, boycotts, and other grassroots efforts. These eventually reverberated throughout the country and were instrumental in defeating apartheid and freeing Nelson Mandela.

"These are powerful stories, about truth overcoming lies, love dissolving evil, and life eclipsing death," said former president Jimmy Carter of the documentary. "Nonviolent valor can end oppression, and the world of the 21st century will be safer, freer and more humane if it heeds the lessons of this series."

We Need Your Feedback! Our Whole Lives: Sexuality Education

Has your young child ever asked you, “where did I come from?” or “how did that lady get a baby in her belly?” Many parents struggle with finding just the right words to say to their children regarding sexuality. There is a great deal of information and resources for parents and children about this subject. With your support, Plymouth would like to implement the *Our Whole Lives (OWL) Sexuality Education Programs* into our Youth Education programming. *OWL* is a sexuality education program that encourages open, honest, and comprehensive sexuality education throughout the lifespan. There is curriculum available for grades K-1, 4-6, 7-9, 10-12, and there is even a program for adults.

At this time, we would like to receive feedback from our congregation regarding interest in the K-1 and 4-6 *OWL* programs. The K-1 program is an eight session curriculum for five- to seven- year old children in kindergarten and first grade. The *OWL 4-6* program is an eight session curriculum designed to help fourth, fifth, and sixth grade children gain the knowledge, life principles, and skills they need to express their sexuality in life enhancing ways. There is a large parent component in these programs, including a 2 and ½ hour parent orientation meeting, as well as 1 or 2 sessions a parent must attend with their child.

The *OWL K-1* and *4-6* programs nurtures and supports the three R’s of early childhood sexuality education-*Respect, Relationships, and Responsibility*-by helping children increase self-respect and respect for others, build relationships with members of both genders and with many kinds of families, and understand their responsibilities regarding their own health and that of others. The program is taught by leaders from the congregation and the community that have been trained and selected to be *OWL* instructors.

The goals of the program include:

- ◆ To help children recognize and appreciate their bodies as good and beautiful, private and special
- ◆ To strengthen and support each child’s sense of self and self-esteem
- ◆ To help children develop effective communication skills
- ◆ To strengthen parents’ roles as their children’s most important sexuality educators

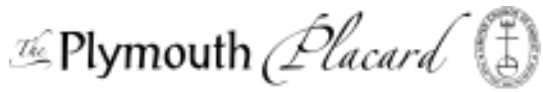
